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WE CARRY OUT APPLIED RESEARCH

We produce critical and independent analysis, contributing to a better understanding of the issues faced by Peru and the Global South. Through our new Projects and Professional Development Unit (UPDP), we have expanded our capacities regarding identifying, procuring and executing research and consultancy projects related to the research areas at GRADE.



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WE BOOST DECISION-MAKING CAPACITIES

Since 1980, GRADE has carried out pedagogical work, training generations of young researchers as well as taking part in seminars, training workshops and courses. At present, the UPDP is in charge of providing training in GRADE's research areas to a wide audience.

Dozens of public servants, NGO staffers and workers from the private sector have studied in our classrooms and taken part in practical, high-level training experiences, based on our core values:

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GRADE THROUGHOUT HISTORY

Our most prominent projects, networks and alliances in our forty-year history

• 1980

Claudio Herzka, Hélan Jaworski and Francisco Sagasti sign the act of incorporation for GRADE.

The valuable support we have received throughout the years from Canada's International Development Research Centre (IDRC) begins. The agreement for the development of the Engineering Firms and Technological Development project is signed.

1984

We implement the Studies and Research Programme on Options and Strategies for Long-Term Development in Peru. We receive funding from IDRC, USAID, the Foundation for the Development of the Public Sector, the Ford Foundation and the Tinker Foundation.

• 1989

We assume a promoting and coordinating role in the creation of the Economic Research Committee (today, the Economic and Social Research Committee), with support from IDRC and the Canadian Agency for International Development.

We carry out the Plan for Stabilisation and Growth in Peru, together with the Brookings Institution. We receive funding from BID, the World Bank, the Swiss Foundation for Technical Cooperation, the Friedrich Ebert Foundation and CONFIEP.

• 1993

We take part in the General Diagnostic of Peruvian Education, the preparatory phase for the Plan for Quality Improvement in Peruvian Education.

1994

Our researchers begin their participation as associates in the Permanent Agricultural Research Seminar (SEPIA).

We carry out the Participatory Democracy project (DEMPAR), together with USAID. The project lasts four years.

• 1996

We provide technical counsel for the constitution of the Educational Quality Measuring Department in the Ministry of Education (MINEDU).

1998

We coordinate the Task Group for the Standards and Assessment in the Promotion of Educational Reform Plan for Latin America and the Caribbean (GTEE-PREAL) during more than a decade. PREAL was part of the Inter-American Roundtable.

2001

We coordinate the Niños del Milenio (Young Lives) study, in alliance with the Nutritional Research Institute. The study is carried out in Peru, Ethiopia, India and Vietnam. The main funding source comes from the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO).

2003

We carry out the Research for a Better Education project, a precursor to the SIEP.

2007

We lead the Latin American office for the Network of Economic Policies and Poverty (PEP).

2010

We are selected to take part in the IDRC Think Tank Initiative project. We are beneficiaries for eight years.

We join the Evidence and Lessons from Latin America (ELLA) network.

We also join the Latin American Initiative for Public Policies Research (ILAIPP).

2011

We create the Information and Communications Unit (UNIC).

2013

We carry out the Strengthening of Education Management in Peru (FORGE). We receive funding from the Canadian Government, through its Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development. The project lasts five years.

2014

We become part of the Sofia Group – Women Researchers in Social Sciences in Peru, along with CISEPA, CIUP and IEP.

2016

We organise the 17th Annual Global Development Network Conference, together with MINEDU and with the collaboration of Universidad del Pacífico.

2017

We become part of the Latin American Anti-Corruption Network (ReAL).

2019

We create the Projects and Professional Development Unit (UPDP).

We are selected as operations headquarters for the Southern Voice network

We create the Innovation Laboratory Against Corruption, with support from PNUD.
